votes on it. He might not get 25. So as they used to say, mark well what you do. And in order to give Senator Landis an opportunity...how much time do I have, Mr. Speaker?

SPEAKER BROMM PRESIDING

SPEAKER BROMM: A little over one minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'm going to give Senator Landis an opportunity. Senator Landis, would you like a minute to explain why you want cloture? And I'll give you the rest of the time.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Landis, if you'd like, you have a little less than a minute.

SENATOR LANDIS: I think we've exhausted the intellectual content of the exchange. The information is on the table, and the body would be in a position to make a value judgment.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Landis. You still have 30 seconds, Senator Chambers, but you...are you yielding the rest of the time to no one?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, I want to use...I don't want any time to be wasted. My effort this afternoon is to take and use as much time as I can. I'm going to save Senator Landis the trouble of asking for a call of the house and a roll call vote, because I definitely want a record of what it is that we do. And that's all that I will take, Mr. Speaker. And this is the last bit of collegiality I will show, by returning whatever seconds I have.

SPEAKER BROMM: Time is up, Senator Chambers. (Laughter) Mr. Clerk. Senator Chambers, sorry, that was your closing, I guess. And did you say you did want a call of the house?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SPEAKER BROMM: A call of the house has been requested. All in favor please vote aye, and opposed nay. Please record.

CLERK: 24 ayes, 0 nays, to place the house under call,
