SENATOR TYSON: Thank you, Mr. President. I'll be very brief on this. I don't know the body's sentiment. I think I do, but I may be wrong. I did ascertain one thing today in the course of a radio interview. I said that I had heard about the amounts of money that had been raised for it and against it. And I thought it was something like nine to one. That's not true. It's about six to one. About \$63,000 was raised to defeat it. And I think the figure was three hundred and eighty-some thousand dollars was spent. I have been told that most of that money comes from a single contributor, as has most of the money across the country come from a single contributor in Kansas, the Koch Industries. I don't know if that's true or not. I do know that, in my view, term limits constitutes a disenfranchisement of the electorate. And that I think is wrong. And as has been noted innumerable other times, we have term limits. We've always had them. All you have to do is go to the polls and vote against. And I would urge you to support the committee amendments. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Tyson. Senator Schimek on Exec Board's AM0783.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes. Thank you, Mr. President. I stand in support of the bill, and...but do have some questions about strategy which I may or may not get time to ask. But if you'll note, I did pass out an orange sheet. I'm trying to compete with Senator Brashear. By the way, Senator Brashear, could we pick our successors? (Laugh) But you will notice, from these figures, that the number of people have...who are...who do support term limits, percentagewise, has gone down, since almost 70 percent in 1992, to 56 percent in the 2000 general election. And I get the feeling, as I talk with people, that they really are beginning to consider what is going to happen if we do continue with the term limits provision in our constitution. I think that as I've looked at other states who have had term limits, there is one feature which really distinguishes us from other states, and that is that we have a one-house legislature. In other states, people who are term limited can then run for a seat in the other house, and vice versa, so that you still have some experience in your house or in your senate. And in fact,
