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your constituents think you should be doing, you get turned out to pasture. And it's happened. And with the average stay of six years, you know, why were the people thinking that we needed term limits? I think it was a fad that was sweeping across the country, and someone thought, well, we'll pick on the Nebraska Legislature now. What it could...what term limits could do is create the end of the Unicameral, because with that in place, people would say, oh, possibly we made a mistake; in order for us to keep people there that we want, we should do away with the Unicameral and put a two-house system in. That way, we could do...or this body could do like other states who have...well, everyone else has a two-house system. So then you could move back and forth from one house to the other. And, listen, I...you've heard me say this before. I see nothing wrong with letting people vote. And if we don't bring something before the people, the people will do it themselves. In this case, that is what has happened. And now we are asking them to...we would be asking them a second chance on rectifying what they have done. And I believe that your constituents now are thinking twice about what has happened. Now, I believe, if I'm wrong, someone correct me, but if we would get that passed this year, I believe it could be on the primary ballot, I think. You know, if I'm wrong, someone correct me. But that, in my opinion, would be the best place to have it, because I think those voters are the more informed voters than the ones at the general election. And you have...you tend to have better people who are voting in the primary, with an understanding of what is happening. So with that, Senator Cudaback, I would give the rest of my time to Senator Schimek, if she would like it.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schimek, you have about two minutes.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes. Thank you very much, Senator Janssen. Just coming to your desk is...it's a little bit dated, but not that bad...an update on some of the 2002 proposals before different legislatures to modify or repeal their term limits. And 21 states, at one time or another, have had term limits. And as Senator Bromm said, now there are 17. So that means four of them have either had them overturned by the courts, or they have repealed them. So...and some states, like North Dakota, never passed them in the first place. So somehow they fought
