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into contracts. In our constitution, I believe the State Treasurer was term limited from the beginning of the constitution. And it was also an issue of financial management and contracts and those kinds of things, and not having so much power, all their power of appointments in one individual, all the power of entering into contracts by the state in one individual, whereas term limits for legislators came about very recently, in the post-Watergate era, when there was just a disdain for elected officials generally. But there wasn't such a connection between the power in one hand, but just a sort of general disdain for legislatures. And so that's when term limits came into place. There was, in Nebraska, and maybe in some other states, an initial attempt to term limit Congress, which was perceived as being really the issue. And we cannot impose on Congress, or at least on the members of Congress from Nebraska, different standards than in other states. And so that was struck down. But it's really a very different kind of thing. And I don't believe that there is any relationship...now, it may seem that way to the voters, but I don't think there's a relationship between the term limits that there are on a Governor, a single individual who makes appointments and enters into contracts and is the executive of the state of Nebraska, and term limits for us, who are a large group of people who set the policy. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Brown. Senator Schimek. And this will be your third time, Senator. She waives the opportunity. There are no further lights on. Senator Engel, you're recognized to close on AM0783, offered by the Exec Board.

SENATOR ENGEL: Mr. Speaker, members of the body, appreciate all the conversation and the discussion on this particular amendment; a lot of good thoughts, and so forth. But I do believe that this is very, very important, and I think it's something that we should offer to the people of the state of Nebraska to reconsider, because of, like I say, when this was brought about, there was a lot of outside money brought in, a lot of pressure for people to vote. And a lot of times, people really don't understand. I'm not calling anybody not knowing what they're doing. But sometimes they really don't fully understand the problems until they experience them. So I think
