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SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Stuthman. Senator Hartnett.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Mr. Speaker, members, I...Senator Stuthman hit some of the points. Senator Brashear, if I could ask you questions?

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator...

SENATOR HARTNETT: And I want to kind of follow up on what Senator Stuthman, the question asked. It says that in renovation of existing building...I'm on page 4, lines 21 to 23. Renovation of existing building that increases the market value of a building or unit by at least 100 percent, is what the language is. And if I listen to Senator Stuthman, they...the only...that would be determined in the future by the county assessor. Do you agree, Senator Brashear?

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Brashear.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: (microphone malfunction)...not. Excuse me, Mr. Speaker.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Oh, you do not. Okay. All right.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: And I said it that way just so we can begin to make a distinction.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Okay.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: I disagree with Senator Stuthman's characterizations. And I'll explain if and when you want me to.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Okay. And the second one is the renovation...the next language on page...or, on the same page, Senator Brashear, lines 24. When renovation increases no less than 75 percent of the square...determined by whom? I guess I would like to say, how are these two points determined? You know, do I determine? I'm going to build on to my building, and I say...you know, I'm going to build this little shed, and it's going to be...who makes that determination, and how do we
