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again, I'm just trying to make clear that this is perhaps inaccurate. As I read the Governor's budget, his planning for the possibility of that lawsuit is the Cash Reserve Fund.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I think that's right.

SENATOR BOURNE: Okay.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: But once again, this has all occurred before the \$69 million additional loss in revenue that we had in the February forecast.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you. Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. I'm going to pay very close attention to Senator Erdman's amendment. I think that...I'm actually...I'm glad that he brought this forth. And I look forward to the Appropriations Committee's members saying why each and every one of these is or is not doable. We hear a lot of talk on here. Senator Tyson earlier today said, be sure when you talk that you give my motto, the "cut, cut, cut" motto. And I think there's perhaps a misperception or a misconception that there's a lot of additional cuts to be made. And I think that a pretty good analogy, after you read the Appropriations Committee's budget is, the trough is pretty much scraped clean. And so maybe we need to look at reducing the size of the trough. Maybe we need to look at closing facilities, schools, colleges, correctional facilities, things of that nature. But I think the Appropriations Committee has done a fantastic job of picking up a lot of the loose money, or low-hanging fruit, as referred to in the editorial. I think they've done a great job of that. But maybe we do need to look at structural changes, closing...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BOURNE: ...facilities, things of that nature. Senator Wehrbein, I'm sorry there's not much time left. I'd be happy to yield it to you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Wehrbein, about one minute.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Thank you, Mister...Senator Bourne. I
