debates on this floor over whether to go to the principal, whether not to go to the principal. We have chosen not to. And I can remember Senator Beutler getting whipped on...well, he might not have seen it that way...but getting defeated on that idea a couple years ago. So we do have to make a policy change. But I'm going to argue that the main reason the states fought to get the cigarette tax money was to take care of the costs and put prevention in place so that the taxpayers don't have to pay so much for smoking related diseases. And one of the first things we should have done, and it was the first thing we did, was fund these kinds of programs. That's what the money was for. But once the money got here, then we had a lot of other interests come in. And we brokered a deal. And we didn't have quite enough money to make everybody happy. And we didn't set aside a way to continue to fund these programs, which should be our number one, first priority. When we discussed this in the Appropriations Committee, the way we came to it, the Governor proposed the General Fund money. We instead, as a committee, said, we've got money from the cigarette tax that's been dedicated to the Cash Reserve; let's use that money for this purpose, and get us through, and hope that the investments improve so we can fund this program out of the tobacco settlement money eventually. And that's the compromise that we worked out in committee and that we supported in committee. That's why it looks like a General Fund, and is indirectly, if you take the money from the Cash Reserve, it's a fund that's being used that was...did come from tobacco revenue to fund this program. We are at a point now where we're going to argue about how do we continue to fund the program. I hope the thing that we do is to continue to fund the program. This should be the number one priority of the money from the tobacco settlement. It needs to be there. And just because a lot of interest came in and a lot of work was done and we all had to...there were two committees, and I don't think...Senator Raikes and Senator Brashear weren't on either of the committees, but it was the Appropriations Committee and the Health and Human Services Committee. When we tried to get that deal put together with everyone who wanted some of the tobacco settlement interest income, the way we worked it out was to continue...this had already had funding, and we put the new deal together, and we didn't end up with enough money to continue it on.
