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and what we really need to do is to have the courage to raise the money to do what should be done. And I keep wondering about these suggestions of compromise. The Appropriations Committee has cut or transferred \$400 million and is suggesting a lesser amount than that...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...as far as revenue raising is concerned. Now, back in the special session, fifty-fifty balance, that was what everybody wanted, that's what we did. But here, we don't even have a fifty-fifty balance, but that's not enough. That's not enough. And Senator Erdman talked about a compromise between 350 and 0, as if anybody wanted 0. Three hundred and fifty was already a compromise, about a halfway compromise, with what the Governor suggested. At what point are we so embarrassed by the results that we don't need to look to this idea of compromise anymore? I think we have to stand for good public policy at a certain point, and we find what good public policy is by examining all these issues, one by one if necessary.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Time.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Thank you.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Beutler. (Visitors introduced.) Back to the debate on the Raikes amendment. Seeing no lights, Senator Raikes, would you care to close on your amendment?

SENATOR RAIKES: I would, thank you, Madam President. Members of the Legislature, I urge your support of this amendment. It's not a lot of money, but it is a very important position. It's very important to you, the people who are entrusted with decisions about state-funded programs that deal with tax incentives and other economic development programs. This is a very small price to have to pay to ensure that you have appropriate information available to make these decisions. I think that's the essence of it. It is...I think it's clearly the most efficient and economical way we can get this
