Well, Senator Schimek is right. The train is coming. People can be on the track if they want to. The Department of Corrections is on the track. The Legislature will be dealing with one of the fastest growing budgets in the state, as was pointed out. We are not talking about shutting down the Department of Corrections. We're not talking about turning loose everybody who is locked up. We are talking about addressing a very serious problem that is growing increasingly severe and no solution in sight. We have a responsibility as a Legislature to set policy, then oversee the implementation of that policy. As I have said before, it is not what the Legislature says in the law, it is what those who administer and apply the law do with it. This is why the Legislature needs to exercise more active and serious oversight. If they want to tell us we're intruding, we tell them, you call it whatever you want to. We spend the money. We want accountability. We enact statutes, and we expect them to be obeyed. You've got an institution full of people who are here because they purportedly violated the law. Well, what do we do with Corrections people who disregard our laws? So far, we've done nothing. This is a step in the right direction, not just an exercise in oversight, but it is going to show that we will not go along with continued building and building and building, and we have not just the cost of construction but the cost of administration. And it grows like Topsy. I won't tell you all who Topsy was. It's in literature, American literature, if you want to call American literature literature rather than litter. But check it out and you will see what it is that I'm talking about. I hope we will now adopt Senator Dwite Pedersen's amendment. We can have a study resolution. Any and everybody will have the opportunity to offer input. And if the Corrections people come, they better have their books and they better have them in order. They better have name, date, service number and everything else. And as far as dates and specifics,...
