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SENATOR BYARS: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. I'm actually not even opposed to the money that I think Senator Smith would appropriate...like for the Panhandle. I think they have...they've done a...they're good people. I think their intentions are absolutely where they should be with public health. The problem I think, as Senator Jensen has pointed out, was when we put this minority health piece together it was a very finely tuned, finely balanced give and take, and I don't think we've talked about the piece where, as we determined that the federally qualified health centers in Omaha would have a different appropriation from the tobacco settlement money than the rest of the minority community, they, in effect, can't double-dip. The dollars that we allocate for them, they can't reach in to the additional minority health money and receive additional dollars. And in effect, this is what we're talking about for the Panhandle, in addition to the dollars they're receiving, is giving them an additional appropriation. That's why it's important that we don't try to do this at this time on the floor of the Legislature. What I would propose and I think what Senator Jensen is proposing, and I think our committee feels pretty strongly about, maybe not, they'll have to speak for themselves, but let's bring all of the federally qualified health centers, let's bring the minority community together over a period of the interim and come back next year and really true...see what equity is. I'm not even questioning Senator Smith. If they're not being treated equitably, then they should be. But there are other health centers that are coming on board that are going to need to be treated fairly also, and I'm adamant the health center that's about to be approved by Congress in Lincoln and the health center that's been approved in Columbus, what's equitable for them? And we need to continue to look at what promises we made to the Omaha community and to the minority community within Omaha, and we do treat them differently because of the fact that we carved out a piece of that money for them. So, as much as I hate it, I have to stand in opposition to the Smith amendment, but I certainly will be supportive of coming together with them and bringing everybody to the table so we take this infinite amount of money and make good decisions on how it is that we allocate it. So I don't stand opposed to what Senator Smith is doing, but I stand opposed to what we're doing at this point. Yield my time back
