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SENATOR LANDIS: I would respond. I don't know of such a mechanism. I do know that the Revenue Department internally can use industrial codes and can know information inside the Department of Revenue which they cannot share outside the Department of Revenue. So, let me tell you, for our purposes, I...

SENATOR BAKER: One minute.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...don't know that the Revenue Department can do that.

SENATOR BAKER: One minute.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you. I don't know that the Revenue Department can do it by individual kinds of product or industry or business, to break out what a particular good creates in the way of sales tax revenue. And it's entirely possible that if they can do that, they couldn't share that with us anyway.

SPEAKER BROMM: Well, then I would ask Senator Brashear, when he has time, to give us the information as to how the implementation of this could work in a practical sense, how...what procedures could be utilized in order to capture, to recognize, to identify the so-called windfall that is occurring. You know, the better measure, I think, is simply to reduce the...

SENATOR BAKER: Time.

SPEAKER BROMM: ...rate of tax, if we have a windfall, in that sense. But that's not what we're doing. So, thank you.

SENATOR BAKER: Thank you, Senator Landis, Senator Bromm. Senator Burling, you're recognized to speak.

SENATOR BURLING: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the body. I stand in opposition to AM1898, for some of the reasons that have been expressed, and for many of the same reasons that Senator Bromm has been talking about. I think it would be a
