of kitchen facilities. You're going to have to provide maintenance. You're going to have to provide all kinds of services that are for both institutions now. They would only be for one, but you're still going to have to have staff. So you can't completely eliminate all of those kinds of expenses. In addition to that, there are a number of programs that occur at Lincoln Correctional Center, and they don't occur anywhere else in our system. And I'm talking about things like sex offender counseling, drug counseling, and those kinds of programs. And you have some of the most serious kinds of prisoners in the Lincoln Correctional Center. Either you're going to...you're going to be able to do one of two things here if you close the Lincoln Correctional Center. You're either going to not provide those programs anymore, and that will be part of that savings, or you're going to have to transfer the personnel who provide those programs into another setting, and maybe not have any cost savings in those personnel at all. Lincoln Correctional Center provides very unique services to our whole prison system. And they don't occur in any other setting, in the penitentiary, nor Tecumseh, nor anyplace else, as I understand it. And I'm trying to get up to speed, because I'm not on the Judiciary Committee, and I'm not fully cognizant of all of these issues, as I'm sure many of you probably aren't. I guess I would like, at this point, to end, and tell you that...tell you some capacity figures, if I can find them here. Which I can't. So I guess I will come back with that at a later date. I will, however, tell you about some of the prisoners who are at LCC who will have to be moved...who will have to be let go, according to the provisions. And some of those prisoners are not your common, ordinary variety of prisoner. Some of them have multiple offenses. For instance, one of them I'm looking at right now has obstructing an officer, third-degree assault, DUI second offense, liquor in the park area, hit and run, leaving the scene, assault and battery, disorderly conduct, thir' degree assault. This is one person I'm talking about. Arson, burglary, disorderly conduct, theft, liquor on public property, park curfew, DUS, whatever that is, DUI, possession of marijuana, less than one ounce, MIP, receiving stolen item, disorderly conduct. That's only half of the list c this one individual prisoner. Are these the kinds of people that you really want to turn out? Or do we instead want to decide which
