SENATOR Dw. PEDERSEN: Thank you. Thank you, Mr. President and thank you, Senator Don Pederson. The capacities sheet that was handed out by Senator Schimek is very close to what I handed out yesterday, so it only changed a little bit. But what I'm saying,...

SENATOR BAKER: One minute.

SENATOR Dw. PEDERSEN: ...what that paper is trying to do is to tell you that these people are going to go to these other prisons without parole and will overcrowd them. If we don't parole them, yes, it will. And that isn't the intention of what we did yesterday. The intention is to parole. My last statement on this bit of time is to talk to you a little bit about the sex offender unit. Yes, we have a sex offender unit. And I can tell you, in the years of 1997, out of 78 admissions, one successfully completed it; in 1998, 77 admissions, none completed it; in 1999, 85 admissions, none completed it; in 2000, 75 admission, one completed; in 2001, 81 admissions, five completed; 2002, 77 admissions, six completed.

SENATOR BAKER: Time.

SENATOR Dw. PEDERSEN: That's not a treatment facility. It's just a look-good program.

SENATOR BAKER: Thank you, Senator Pedersen. Senator Brown will be followed by Senator Tyson, Beutler, Brashear, Johnson, Synowiecki, and others. Senator Brown, you're recognized to speak.

SENATOR BROWN: Mr. President, members, I did not support this amendment last night. I did support the Don Pederson amendment. And had that not been adopted, I would have had a lot more heartburn about what we did, and possibly even been willing to look at a reconsideration. I am not at this point in time willing to look at a reconsideration. I do think that this has shaken up the establishment within the administration, and that we will be getting some ideas about some ways that we might be able to deal with the burgeoning costs in this area. And we
