length, that this could be done. We talked about the effects of the jamming, and having people just come out of prison without guidance, and what happens then. We didn't get much help from the prison system. Maybe we need to help them a little bit to get thinking so that they become part of the team in doing something correct. There's lots of things that have happened. You can tell where a car is now within two feet. I expect you can tell where a prisoner is within two feet as well. What do we do with this technology? Not very much that I can tell. So, I have some of the greatest respect for the people on our Judiciary Committee. I'm sure over the year and a half that we've given them to adjust to this bill, I think we'll all be satisfied with the process. If I have any time left, I would leave it to Senator Dwite Pedersen. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Johnson. Senator Pedersen, you have a minute and twenty seconds.

SENATOR Dw. PEDERSEN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and thank you, Senator Johnson. First of all, Senator Beutler, I want you to know that there was a bill in Judiciary Committee this year, LB 455. It was my bill. And it talked about parole. LB 455 was advanced to the floor with unanimous vote of the Judiciary Committee except for one person absent.

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR Dw. PEDERSEN: We talked about parole. Parole is talked about heavily, as Senator Brashear said, in LB 46. Senator Tyson talked about a person, again giving a record of somebody who shouldn't be paroled. AM1778 does not close the Department of Corrections; it closes one facility. We still have, after this facility would close down, if it closes, 3,500 beds, 3,500 beds. Now, not all of them are maximum-security beds. But the NSP is a maximum-security facility, and Tecumseh, as you know, is supposed to be a super-max facility. There's 836 inmates at Tecumseh, design capacity of 960. If you take half of what's at NSP, which is 1,000,...
