effort to insert something into the bill that I think goes along with this whole subject matter as we have approached this budget. And as many of us have spoken with many groups and tried to find answers for the revenue and the expenditure side, again and again I think it's been suggested, at least to me, that we ought to consider another comprehensive look...effort to look at both the tax structure of our state and the revenue and spending, and the government...call it the government and education structure. This amendment would suggest that the Executive Board appoint the Chairpersons of the Standing Committees, Chairperson of Exec Board and the Speaker to serve on a task force to review government structure and taxation, and that this task force would examine all the major taxes that we have in the state, exemptions and credits and preferences and relative reliance upon these taxes, combined burden for Nebraska taxpayers and their relative variety of situations. We'd also look at the various political subdivisions and educational facilities that we are statutorily and constitutionally authorized under our Nebraska laws, and what their purpose, role, function, and necessity is. It also says that we could include other lay/professional organizational and governmental representatives in analyzing and developing a report, summarizing any recommendations for the restructure of government and education, or the revision of our tax structure. We could do this in an interim study, and I have the interim study language prepared too as far as that's concerned, but as important of a bill as this is, and as much as it does, both on the, before we're done, on the spending side and just the overall comprehensiveness of the bill, I thought it was appropriate to offer this suggestion on this bill as an effort to see whether we want to undertake this. I would envision that we would involve most of all the various committee staffs in some way. I would hope that we could also get some help out of other governmental staff people, whether it be the University of Nebraska or others, to try to compile the best information that we can. This is, of course, an ongoing thing that ought to be done, but I think it's particularly timely at this point, when we're under the gun, both from the standpoint of taxation and spending and structure and organization. It's especially timely and it adds a dimension of seriousness to the effort, if it's undertaken at the right time. These efforts have been
