2 percent from the employee and the additional court fees, just to take care of the deficit problem.

SENATOR McDONALD: Okay. Now in order to fund these enhanced benefits, where's that money coming from?

SENATOR BEUTLER: That money would...well, I guess you can say it this way. The enhanced contribution was already there, so the new money that was put into the bill by the Brashear amendment was \$1 of court fee, which is about \$400,000. But that doesn't nearly cover the benefits that will be paid as soon as these things kick in.

SENATOR McDONALD: Okay, and that's my concern, because we're actually adding more benefits and down the road are we going to have to continue to make the plan whole again? You know, these are issues that I think that we need to think about. If we're not funding it at this point and the market doesn't turn around at some point in time to fund the enhanced benefits, we're going to have to continue to put money in. I'm going to continue to listen to the debate. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator McDonald. Senator Brashear.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Mr. Speaker, members of the body, I was trying to follow, and also deal with other things, but follow the dialogue between Senator McDonald and Senator Beutler, and to the extent that I believe I heard something different than what I understand, I want to clarify it. Then they can respond on their own time. I would contend that this is not the committee amendment. It has been modified. The judges are being required under what's...under the bill, as it's presently constituted before you, which is after the amendment that I offered on General File that you adopted. The judges are required to begin an immediate total increase in their contribution. It goes from 6 percent to 8 percent for what we've denoted as active judges, which doesn't make sense, but anyway that's what it's called during the 20-year period. And for those who are beyond the 20-year period, the contribution immediately goes from 0 to 4 percent. So there is an immediate increase in contribution that aggregates \$400,000 of increased
