tax is too high. So they'll bring a bushel of Winstons back with them, when they come back in the spring; sit and puff around on them until it's time to go back to Arizona again. I don't smoke. I don't think anybody should smoke. But people, as long as it's a legal product, they're going to use that product. We've got all kinds of programs for...in schools that tell you the ills of alcohol and the ills of tobacco. I'm sorry, Senator Bromm, but I'm not going to support this amendment. I think it's the wrong way to go. It's my personal opinion, take it for what it's worth. But I think it's the wrong way to go with these dollars when we are in this kind of a situation we are right now. With that, thank you. I'll turn the rest of my time back to the Chair, or I'll give it to Senator Bourne. I'll give you the rest of my time.

SENATOR ENGEL: Senator Bourne, you're recognized.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Senator Janssen. I'm glad to hear...

SENATOR ENGEL: You have one minute.

SENATOR BOURNE: ...somebody speak (laugh) on my side of this, after a fashion. But I rise again in opposition to this. You know, earlier today, and, again, I want to repeat this because it bears repeating, we eliminated what was called MRF money. And I can go through the list, if you'd like, and kind of tell me what communities actually lost because of that earmark being eliminated. I didn't want to do that. Omaha lost about \$900,000, Alliance lost \$20,000, Beatrice \$28,000, Bellevue \$104,000, Columbus \$48,000, Elkhorn \$17,000. I'm just giving you some of the top ones. It's based on population. Getting, out there in Scotts Bluff, \$17,000, Scotts Bluff County. I mean what we did this morning is the same amount of money...
