SENATOR RAIKES: I think I understood the concern Senator Stuthman was raising. He's concerned about contractors who maybe are infrequent business people or have very small businesses and do projects that don't generate a lot of labor income, or service income, if you will.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Jensen.

SENATOR RAIKES: Your concern, though, was different. And if you could restate that for me.

SENATOR JENSEN: Yes, Senator Raikes. Many times you hire a contractor to do a remodeling job, be it on a kitchen or whatever. And I don't know if you've gone through that process either as a contractor or as an individual. But quite often, that job that started out to be a \$2,000 job pretty soon was 7, 8, 10. I have experienced up to...I was hired one time for a \$5,000 job that ended up to be a \$65,000 job, and they were happy. I think I was happy also, but still it's that type of thing that once you start into something, where do you end?

SENATOR RAIKES: Suppose you got a \$10,000 job, now if we can start there and you can express to me your concern.

SENATOR JENSEN: Well, if you got a \$10,000 job, that you would start paying tax on, and then pretty soon the expense might have gotten to the point where it was over the benchmark that's in this bill. Then what happens?

SENATOR RAIKES: Oh, okay.

SENATOR JENSEN: And how do you proceed then? And it just seemed to me that there is a tremendous amount of bookwork, a lot of paperwork that's going to go back and forth between the department and...

SENATOR RAIKES: But isn't it the case, the way the bill is set up, that the...that there would be a refund procedure in place?

SENATOR JENSEN: That's what I'm understanding. However, you have to apply for the refund and then is there somebody going to
