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the point that this isn't all reinventing the wheel. There are states that are doing this now. So we'll be able to get some...

SENATOR JENSEN: However, Nebraska has not.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Nebraska has not done it before. It's \$55 million of new revenue, yes. (Laugh)

SENATOR JENSEN: I have heard that figure before somewhere. Well, thank you, Senator Brashear. Again, I just really think that we are going to expand the paperwork of certainly the contractors, the department, the owners, and I just hope that we have enough time. I hope they have enough patience to do this. Senator Stuthman was right. There are a lot of small contractors out there that...which I typically do not deal with, but there are a lot of individuals out there, roofers and concrete men, and so on and so forth, that are expert craftsmen, not great bookkeepers. And I just hope that we can work through this without a lot of hardship to those individuals and discourage those people from ever being in business.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR JENSEN: With that, I'll give the rest of my time back to the Chair. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Jensen. Senator Smith on the Brashear amendment.

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Mr. President and members. We hear the \$55 million number being tossed about, and that certainly does get my attention. And that's what I guess adds to the fact that we're not talking just adding a small little item here. And it's interesting how President Bush comes to our state and based on tax can say that tax cuts will stimulate the economy. And we very well may be reversing such an item if we attempt to take \$55 million out of one segment of our economy, and one that is fairly successful. And that's not to say they are not paying tax because the more successful they are the more income tax we get. Senator Brashear, would you yield to a question?
