statute for other purposes of the criminal law. I think the criminal law; maybe the civil law. I'm just...I let the body do what it wanted to do on that. But I'm not going to vote to extend it any further. If you adopt Senator Foley's amendment, it's just another reason for me to oppose the bill. And I will oppose it, vociferously and ferociously. Maybe Senator Foley's amendment is enough to get the antiabortion people to say, well, they'll support this bill no matter what, because they like that amendment so much. But you ought to realize, there is far more in this bill than Senator Foley's antiabortion position. And he's entitled to bring it up whenever he thinks he can, like I...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...try to persuade the people that we should not discriminate against people because of sexual orientation, and Senator Foley thinks we should. He's been able to prevail on the body on that issue. But he's going to have a whale of a time prevailing on it on his antiabortion issue on this bill, because the bill itself is fraught with problems. Senator Kruse is not a lawyer, and I would not ask him any legal or lawyer type questions. But if those questions were put to me today, I'm just going to acknowledge that I didn't write the bill, so I'm not responsible to have to answer all of these questions. The bill, by the way, did not go to the Judiciary Committee, where it should have gone. But the one-liner may have led to its being sent to the Transportation Committee. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Johnson, followed by Senator Bourne, Senator Dwite Pedersen, and Senator Chambers. Senator Johnson.

SENATOR JOHNSON: Mr. President, in regard to the main bill itself, one of the things that I think...don't think there's any question, that virtually every member in this body would be for making good drinking laws. We still have far too many people killed and maimed on our highways by drunk drivers. But from what Senator Chambers is saying, with this not going through the Judiciary Committee, which it would seem to me that it should
