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it's got alcohol in it, it beeps and sends a warning, and they come get you. If you're sitting in front of your parole officer, probation officer, or whoever you're with, and he wants to know where you were at last Friday, he puts your code into his computer and says, I see where you were at Friday. It's a dotted line that will go through the entire map of Omaha, Lincoln, Hastings, wherever you're at, and tell you where you were at that day. And you put every day on it. It's global tracking. Same thing they do to the trucks. If you are... have some kind of restraining order that you are not supposed to be near somebody, an ex-wife, a child, or something like that, they can draw a line around that area of where you're not supposed to go, and if you enter that line, it beeps and they come get you. It's down to \$7 a day, people. And the people who wear them in other states... we have very, very few of them in this state... pay for their own, the state doesn't pay for them. And others states have set up, for those who can't afford to pay for them, that they pay for them for them, because they find it much cheaper than sending somebody to prison for \$22,000 a year, 22.5. Now, that doesn't mean we have somebody out there who is violent when they got drunk and we have time to pick them up. There's other things that have to be taken into consideration, and maybe they need to be behind barbed wire for our safety. I don't have any problem with that. But we cannot keep using this thing about we're going to lock up more, lock up more, lock up more. We've got to do other things with them. There's a lot of them that would be very glad to wear electronic monitoring and go to their own jobs and pay for their own child support, victimization restitution, fines, and their own board and room. That's what my discussion has always been about. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Pedersen. Senator Chambers, followed by Senators Johnson and Kruse and Bourne.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, this is a 54-page amendment. So on page 50, starting in line 13, is this language. "Any city or village may enact ordinances in conformance with sections 60-6,196 and 60-6,197. Upon conviction of any person of a violation of such a city or village ordinance, the provisions of sections 15 and 16 of this act with respect to the operator's license of such person shall
