And I'm not angry at Senator Kruse. I share his frustration. He accommodated the Transportation Committee. In decency, they should come up to him right now...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...and say, Senator Kruse, we'll strip everything we put into your bill out of it. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Bourne, there are no further lights on. I'm sorry. Your light just came on. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, I just want to wrap up what I was saying. The number of the bill might be the Transportation Committee's bill. I'm not sure about the number. What I meant by my comment is that whether this number is the number under which Senator Kruse's bill was introduced, or it's the number of the Transportation's recodification bill, all of that is irrelevant. What the Transportation Committee ought to do, if it can, is disentangle from Senator Kruse's bill everything that was in the way of a recodification. Then let his bill, what's left of it, stand or fall on its merit, and on the basis of what people understand his bill is about and designed to do. Now, he said he doesn't want you all to vote for the bracket motion. Sometimes you must save a person from himself or herself, and we will rescue Senator Kruse. A decision that has profound implications for a person or a situation should not be made under the heat of great emotion or under feelings that one has when one experiences a defeat.
