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advocates of the contrary position either. Because the first thing that will happen is that somebody in those groups that Senator Foley mentioned would say the Legislature repealed that language, the Legislature does not want the schools involved in this and, by God, they better not be involved, and if a teacher or a nurse or a counselor does this your school is going to be in trouble. I don't have that kind of trust in these groups. I've dealt with them 33 years. This will be my 33rd session. So I'm going to oppose this amendment, and if it's attached to the bill I'm going to oppose the bill. But if, at a later date, Senator Foley and those who feel as he does want to amend 71-6909 to make this permissive and take some of the other things out, such as it has to be this written...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...information and the details, I'm not going to object to that. But since he is opposed to making it permissive, I am opposed to his amendment. He cannot give me that assurance. If he at least knew what these groups were about that support his position, maybe I'd feel differently. I know what they have done, he doesn't, so he does not have the concerns that I have about them trying to pressure the schools if we repeal this language. Is that my third time, Mr. President?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Second, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Thompson. And this will be your third time, Senator Thompson, as you know.

SENATOR THOMPSON: Thank you. I'd like to ask Senator Foley a question, please.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Foley, would you respond to a question from Senator Thompson? Senator Foley.

SENATOR FOLEY: Yes. Yes.
