totally mistrust these groups that Senator Foley mentioned as supporting the abolition of the current statute. They have been pernicious in too many respects and on too many issues. I'd like to ask Senator Foley a question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Foley, would you respond?

SENATOR FOLEY: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Foley, and I'm talking now about the specific groups you named and not people of a particular point of view, are you aware of any of these groups being involved in picketing the homes and churches of individuals who were involved in the abortion issue in a way that displeased them?

SENATOR FOLEY: I have never heard that allegation made with respect to any of these groups.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'm not talking about an allegation. I'm talking about your knowledge.

SENATOR FOLEY: I have no knowledge that...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR FOLEY: ...any of these groups or anybody associated with any of these groups has ever done that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Senator Mossey was trying to get me to ask him a question, but he's...his light is on and this is my third time and I won't get to speak again until my amendment comes up. But if we run out of time, because I'm on my third time, and if perchance Senator Foley's amendment is adopted in the interim, then I'm going to fight this bill. It will be a situation where a jockey bigger than the horse has been placed on the horse and changed the whole course of events. I want to emphasize that I have no objection to making it permissive for a school district. You may have a school district in a very conservative part of the state which would decide that their schools are not going to provide this information. That's what you can call local concern. You might have more progressive
