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this issue from the standpoint of the woman. The woman is the one in existence. The woman is the one whose body and life are involved. The woman should make the decision. Other people think more of fetuses and embryos, and the proof of it, when we're dealing with legislation talking about children, they're against that. So they're not for all...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...human beings. They're for a stage of development. Zygote, embryo or fetus, they can relate to that, but when something comes out into the world yowling and howling and looking for love, suddenly they turn away. Postnatal care? Too expensive. Medicaid for a single mother and her children? Too expensive. Knock 13,000 of them off so they have no insurance, and they'll vote for that. That's why I say their whole philosophy is shot through with hatred, hypocrisy, zealotry, and extremism. And if nobody else will say it, I will. When I see a pregnant woman, I see a woman, I see a human being, and I see one who has a difficult life and very difficult decisions to be made. And when I see some of these hypocritical politicians who skate on the surface of life on every other thing, presuming to put themselves in a position to dictate to this woman the decision she should make...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...about one of the most intimate things in her life, I say as that philosophy Scrooge said, bah, humbug. Did you say time, Mr. President?

SENATOR CUDABACK: I did, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: All right.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. You've heard the opening on FA1364, offered by Senator Chambers to AM0887. Open for discussion on the Chambers amendment. Senator Foley.

SENATOR FOLEY: Thank you, Mr. President and members. I wonder if Senator Chambers would yield.
