the floor, right now, if we do it. Would you agree to that?

SPEAKER BROMM: That is correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If I would pull my amendment and let the bill move on, would you be willing to work with me, and when we get some language that we think won't go beyond what you think ought to do...be done, but approaches what I think ought to be done...in other words, if we arrive at language that we agree on, we would bring the bill back and put the language in at that time, instead of either of us at this moment trying to cobble something together?

SPEAKER BROMM: And it would be in the section that we're talking about right now, Senator Chambers,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SPEAKER BROMM: ...the concern about a finding of not guilty, the concern that there may be a dismissal, for very valid reasons, and yet the ALR doesn't go away. And I tend to agree with you that it should go away under those circumstances. And I would work with you to try to find the language to do that. And I would agree to do that. We may have a little trouble doing it right and doing it in the amount of time that we have here on the floor.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, that's why I don't want to do it now. I'm going to pull my amendment then, and you can...if you want to move on with the bill, I will not impede its being advanced, because we could always bring it back.

SPEAKER BROMM: I have a couple of, I think, procedural amendments that are coming up. But they aren't anything substantive to this part of the bill or anything.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Then Mr. President, what I'm going to do is withdraw my amendment.

SENATOR CUDABACK: It is withdrawn, FA1202.
