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the Bromm amendment, and I'm prepared to throw away the other pieces of the bill at this time because I'm not all that wedded to them. I think we can do better on each of those three other provisions. I think we can do better on wages, we can sure do better on disclosure, and the bad actor provision needs to be written right. And the body I think...so starting over on those I think are acceptable. I'd live with the Bromm amendment. I think it's a piece that I can live with, however, we need time to look at it and we probably can't do it this afternoon. That's fair. I'd suggest that we talk about it, raise our issues, let Senator Bromm and I know what you're concerned about, and then time the time between now and tomorrow to read the bill, read the amendment and think what you think. Is anybody else bound? No. I am, Senator Bromm is, but nobody else. That's the way of understandings. And if the body wants to do something to this or to the bill, fair game. Thank you.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Landis. Senator Stuhr, you are the next speaker.

SENATOR STUHR: Thank you, Madam President and members of the body. I am going to oppose Senator Smith's amendment because I believe that Senator Bromm has brought us a proposal that at least does hit 80, I believe it was, 82 counties. We've been very concerned in the rural areas about having some rural development taking place in those counties and I believe that Senator Bromm's concept is at least the beginning of the right thing to do and I think that we are most concerned about trying to retain those businesses that we have in our rural counties. Sometimes we don't give enough attention. We're more concerned about what new businesses we can bring in, whereas we know that the backbone of our state is built on small businesses and that we must do everything that we can to retain those businesses and to help those businesses grow. I think that's part of rural development. There's also another part for Nebraska in economic development, looking at trying to attract new businesses, but this is a separate area. I think this is a good start. Is Senator Bromm or Senator Landis on the floor? Because I had a couple questions. When I heard Senator Bromm speak about the number of employees, I thought I heard 500. My hearing must be getting bad. I checked the amendment and I believe it's 5.
