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groups were interested in doing that. But I have no updates on the progress of such an effort.

SENATOR ERDMAN: Okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But I know that a lot of people have expressed the fact that their attitude hasn't changed, that I'm the reason term limits was put into the constitution, I'm the reason term limits should stay in the constitution, and until I'm removed from the Legislature, term limits will stay in the constitution.

SENATOR ERDMAN: And I think you're going to be the stone around my neck as well, because we'll be going out at the same time, Senator Chambers. Thank you.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Erdman. Senator Wehrbein, you're recognized to speak.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Madam President, members, I wasn't going to say anything. But since we got stalled just a second, for the record, I'm not going to support moving forward. I know it's...this is the last vote, and we'll lay it over. But just for the record, I think...I agree with what...much of what Senator Schrock said last time we debated this. I think it's a little too early to be doing this. I know the public is adamant on both sides, in many ways. And there's been a firestorm since we did this. And we need to move ahead. And things will be probably determined next year. But as much as I dislike term limits myself, I think it's a little too early to put it on the ballot. I think it is going to cause some problems down the road, in terms of the term limits. But I do still think it's too early to go on the ballot. And I just wanted to get that comments out. Thank you.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Senator Schrock, you're recognized.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Being as Senator Chambers is so agreeable, could I ask him a question?
