large law firm. And a doctor...he was a black man; his name was Claude Organ, head of the surgery department at Creighton...was sent to ask me, would I work for this law firm? And you all are going to think this is a lie. They would pay me \$600 an hour to do research, and they would ask me to work for them five hours a week. And I wouldn't accept it. I said, nobody's time doing research is worth that kind of money. So you are not hiring me to do research.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: You're trying to buy the integrity that attaches to my name. If I would work for your law firm, I don't care how much you paid me, that would be a signal that I think you all are honest. You have to establish that by the way you deal with people. But I still think it is foolish to have term limits and not allow the public to vote for whomever they choose to send down here. Would I vote for everybody on this floor if I had the opportunity? (Laugh) Certainly not. But if people want to send a mule skinner down here, they have a right to do that, because they know who can best represent them. When I offer the bracket motion, if there's an objection, I'm going to withdraw it. And I'm going to vote to advance the bill. And I will not apologize for it. And I will be proud to stand up here. And I might even sing a paean of praise for my colleagues who vote...well, wait a minute, that might prevent some from voting. I'll leave well enough alone. I'm going to do like Senator Cudaback. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Bromm.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Mr. President. I think Senator Chambers said that if there was an objection to unanimous consent, he was going to pull the bracket motion. And I think that there will be an objection, so I think the bracket motion will be pulled. So I think it comes down to the question of whether we advance the bill or not. And I...you each have to do what you got to do. But I think we ought to vote, and we ought to vote on whether to advance it or not. People that are going to come out and criticize us for taking up this subject for the most part have spoken. And they're...they've been very quick to
