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bill, and with the Chambers bill, because it gives us a clearer idea of who's in charge where. And so I think they all fit together very nicely. I think that the Capitol Commission has been an evolutionary process. I think that this bill takes it another step, if you will, in the right direction, and will allow someone, some administrator who is in the office of the commission, to focus entirely on the State Capitol and the State Capitol grounds. And I think that...I'm so anxious to see how this Capitol is going to look once the projects are completed on it, once the relandscaping is done. And I would hope then that we would be able to keep up with all the constant repairs that have to be made to the Capitol. And if you just look in here at this room and look up at the ceiling, you'll see the damage that the TV lights did to that beautiful ceiling up there. You'll see where the rain has come in at different points in the building. These things need to be taken care of, and they need to have somebody...these things need to have someone advocating for them, and to see...and that's not to take anything away from any of the legislative bodies that deal with these kinds of things. But we need somebody to be concentrating on the Capitol and the environs. It is a Nebraska treasure, and it is architecturally one of the finest in the nation, and certainly one of the most unique. The only change, Senator Smith, in the Beutler amendment over the previous Beutler amendment, which has been on file for quite a while, is the change in the appointment of the commission and the way that's appointed, and I don't have the amendment right in front of me, but it's towards the back of that amendment. You can go to the very back of it, and find that change, which I think Senator Beutler outlined probably in his opening, that the three at-large members would be appointed not solely by the Governor, but...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...one of them by each of the branches of government. And that's the only change in that 34-page amendment. So, just for the record, it's not that new, and it has been there for quite some time. And committee counsel has just pointed out to me that it is on page 28 of the amendment, that change. So with that, thank you, Mr. President.
