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there and it was felt that was enough to adopt the amendment, not a dissenting vote, and everybody who was out of the Chamber now would vote for that amendment if they were here. That leads me to say what I said earlier. The public has no idea of how this process works. No one person knows everything, and there are things which some of us know which we may forget or which we may sleep. They'll get by us because we're directing our attention elsewhere. And if there is nobody to catch it, problems develop, and that's what we would like to avoid. There should have been some way to inform the public to a greater extent than is the case now of what being a member of this Legislature means. But I don't think that's possible. When you can ask people which weighs more, a pound of feathers or a pound of stones, and somebody says a pound of stones, then you know that there's a problem. I would like to ask...I want ask somebody who is...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...who knows a lot. I'd like to ask Senator Byars a question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Byars, would you respond?

SENATOR BYARS: I will.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Byars, which weighs more, a pound of gold or a pound of feathers? Think before you answer.

SENATOR BYARS: Senator Chambers, as usual, you just have me totally stumped. I'll have to think through that. If I had more experience maybe I'd be able to answer that question.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'll put on my light, because I think I have one more time. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Stuthman.
