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the Lincoln Correctional Center. Why there's one man who was sent there by the director of Corrections and those who make those decisions who misused state computers. He had sent very foul messages to another employee, married, suggesting anal sex, other types of activities; and this person still has a job and he's been sent to the LCC. He was at Tecumseh. And before he was sent to LCC for that, while Tecumseh was being constructed, he and some underlings, which is known as fraternization, had been drinking liquor before they got there, continued to drink liquor, and went into the guard towers. And there were other employees who happened to be there and saw it. And, you know, people get quiet when I talk like this as though it's inappropriate; but this is a man on the payroll, on the payroll. And there are employees who have been fired for less and this is the Department of Corrections, Senator Schimek. These are the kind of people, I don't mean everybody is like this person. But when you have a blatant case like this and it's handled in this method and it's not even publicized, it makes you wonder what other kind of things are happening at that institution. Inmates know about these things. So when the person who is the deputy warden or assistant warden is doing these kind of things and he's outside the bars, and I'm inside the bars for far less than what he did, how am I to have any respect for this system? So when the Judiciary Committee does conduct the study during the interim, there are many issues which Corrections probably wished would not surface that are going to surface. And I'm going to try to find out why no criminal charges were brought in some of these cases. Physician, heal thyself. And that's what I say about Corrections. That is the agency where we send people to be punished. Who shall punish the punishers? Who shall watch the watchers? In case there are others who may want to have a word or two, I will not pull that motion immediately because I don't want to create the necessity of everybody having to offer such a motion. But I'm not going to leave it up there for an inordinate period of time. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
