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SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes. Thank you, Mr. President and members. Senator Chambers, I probably should have left my motion up there for a while too. But I...what I didn't want to do is I didn't want to encourage a long, lengthy debate on the budget bill if that wasn't what people were already thinking. So I...that's why I pulled mine, and thought if somebody else wanted to put one up, that was fine. But I did want to respond to what you said. And you know, I recognize...I mean, I didn't...I wasn't protesting about the closing because I didn't think that we should ever put anybody out of a job if it was in the state's best interest. My protest was with the process, and the fact that we really didn't have a study of it, we didn't have a public hearing on it, we didn't have a bill on it, we didn't have any idea of what the implications were; and at the same time, we were putting those employees in a very tenuous job situation in which not only would it impact them, but it would impact their families. If they need to be relieved of their jobs and let go by the state or moved to a different institution, then so be it. My only quarrel was with the way we did it, and the fact that we didn't really know how much money we were going to save or what we were going to do. I would not want to be one of the employees who was living with that uncertainty, although I suppose in some respects we all live with uncertainty every day of our lives. But I'm sure that it's going to be...put a strain on things. You and I and Senator Pedersen probably get more letters from both those who are incarcerated and for those correctional officers and staff who are in our correctional department than anybody else in this body. And I think I can say with assurance, yes, there are some problems and, yes, they do need to be looked at. And that's why we have the Judiciary Committee. And I have confidence in you all that you will do a good job. And I don't have a quarrel with that. We need to examine it. I think one of the biggest parts of the budget...and I just got that out this morning to look at that agency budget...the healthcare costs are just out of sight out there now, and we maybe need to come back and revisit that issue and find a way that we can refine that a bit. Well, I don't want people being put out on the street just because they need a heart transplant and the state doesn't want to do it. But yet, you know, if we don't...if we're going to release 500 people, or whatever it is, out onto the streets,
