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to send a chill and say not only do you have to satisfy the criminal and civil law of the state of Nebraska as administered by the Governor and his Department of Revenue, in the executive branch of government, but, by the way, some of we legislators would like to muck around in this area, too, under the guise that we're doing it for the taxpayer. If our Department of Revenue is in that shape, we ought to be doing more than requiring that a Program Evaluation Committee check its work. And it's not like we don't have public information. It's not like we don't make people supply it. And it's not like we don't have all kinds of reporting. It's just we're not getting it the way some people want it. And if you go down that road, then we can all start targeting lots of things. You might be interested in serving on the program evaluation so you can put your spin on what it is you like or you don't like, and then maybe we all want to be on the Program Evaluation Committee.

SENATOR ENGEL: One minute.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Come on. Did you call time, Mr. President?

SENATOR ENGEL: One minute.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Let's constrain ourselves, notwithstanding what's on the agenda today that we don't like and we don't want to debate. Let's talk about good policy here. The Congress of the United States is not checking tax returns and this Legislature ought not either. Thank you.

SENATOR ENGEL: Thank you, Senator Brashear. Senator Brown. Senator Brown.

SENATOR BROWN: Question.

SENATOR ENGEL: The question has been called. Do I see five hands? I do. The question is, shall debate cease? All those in favor vote aye; those opposed vote nay. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 1 nay, Mr. President, to cease debate.

SENATOR ENGEL: Debate ceases. Senator Beutler, you're
