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came out of Telecommunications Committee. What we have here is possibly something we could calm some citizens that are upset with us right now, calm them a little bit with this bill. And what we're trying to do here is obviously balance the privacy interest of people in their own homes with that of business trying to market materials and goods and services to us. That, to me, is what we're about. We're going to have to find a balance here. Now we're going to have some criticism from the lobby outside saying we're too restrictive. We don't want to do this. It's restricting charities and nonprofits in particular. That's where the judgment call is going to come in on this bill to me. Do you want to go ahead and exempt nonprofits and 501(c)(3)s completely? I don't know. I don't. I like the way the bill is written. I have a small amendment to clarify a couple of things in there but, personally, I like the way it is, we not restricting 501(c)(3)s and nonprofits to an extent that I can see is going to harm them. And if we do have to come back next session, change a few things, that's fine, but I want to point out in the bill, and this is going to... I'm trying to paint a broad picture here where we're going to go with this. Charitable contributions, if the resident... I'm talking about page 3 of Senator Smith's AM1484, page 3, line 3, it's exempting a person for the purpose of soliciting a charitable contribution if the residential subscriber has an affiliation as a member or alumnus or is an existing contributor. That's a pretty broad exemption already to me; affiliation as a member or an alumnus or an existing contributor. Whether we want to broaden that or not, I don't know. I do not, myself. I think that's broad enough and I can sympathize with others in this room. I went back to my apartment the other night to pick up my phone and get my voice messages. National, I think it's Consumer... National Consumer something or other, nonprofits. The first thing he said we're a nonprofit organization working with private citizens to consolidate debt, credit card debt in particular. It was a recorded message. I took down the 800 number and called them the next day and did talk to a supervisor, and asked him how this nonprofit organization stayed in business? Where do they get their money to make phone calls? The bottom line was they sold their lists to Chase Manhattan Bank. They were quite straightforward with me. Nonprofit, but in order to stay in business they were selling this list to... it was the bank,
