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federal government's regs. How many do you think have adopted it afterwards? None. They are all waiting to see what...if the federal government list is working. And I don't know if they have a Senator Smith in their state, but they've decided to wait for those big government bills and not go forward with them. So no states have adopted regulations or laws since the fed FTC and the FCC let their regs out, none. Three states have actually stopped moving forward with laws they passed. The state of California adopted a do not call list and stopped. They stopped moving forward with that law until they saw what the federal government's regulations do. If that, a state of, what, 30 million people doesn't need a big government bill,...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Time.

SENATOR BOURNE: ...like Senator Smith's, I don't think we need it either.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Bourne. Senator Smith, you're recognized to speak.

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Madam President. I'm getting a little worked up here based on the rhetoric, that is fun to talk about, but the fact is Senator Bourne just pointed out the fact that his list, and I don't know whether he's a paid employee of the Direct Marketing Association or something, but Senator Thompson said, yes, I signed up but I still get calls from telecommunications companies. And the fact is that the FTC, the federal part, they are moving forward, yes. It has taken them I don't know how many years to do that. They are moving forward in establishing a list. The FCC, which governs telecommunications companies, they're the ones who haven't done anything yet. And I'm tired of hearing the lip service that they are going to do something and I believe it's the state's role to step in and make it happen. We have fashioned something that is more efficient than the green copy of either bill that was introduced this year. And it's really fun to stand up here and say that Senator Smith is a big government. I think common sense would say that this is a solution to a problem that is workable. Does everyone love it? No, because not everyone is exempted. If everyone was exempted, only the consumers would
