positions. I characterize mine, and he chose to accept and follow that which has been repudiated, which he is allowed to do. If any of you all watched any portions of that movie, because that's what it was, about Hitler, there are principles, ideas, political positions which some will say have been repudiated, but they haven't been repudiated by everybody. There are people who put the word or the letters "neo" in front of their name so that they can put a dash and add "Nazi." They mean they're the new Nazis. They believe just like Hitler; they'd like to do what Hitler did. They don't think what Hitler did was wrong. They just regret that he met an unkind fate before he could achieve his desired end, but since he did meet that unkind fate they're going to do what they can to bring it to fruition. Well, these are the kind of things that need to be discussed on this floor when an issue is before us. Now, Senator Foley has brought Senator Beutler into the fray, and Senator Beutler has given Senator Foley time, so I presume they are holding to the same opinion. Senator Beutler has not stood on the floor and reputed his as I've repudiated mine, so I guess he and Senator Foley are in lockstep. They have a right to do that. They have a right to yield time to each other.

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I've done that and will continue to do it. But we mark ourselves by our words and our deeds. Now Senator Beutler would not yield me time on an issue that he and I disagreed on, but when we're on this floor, I don't care how many people gang up and clump together against an opinion that I express. I'm going to express that opinion. I will not run and hide. I will not bite my tongue. And if they want to relay...relate on the floor what is relayed to them from outside the glass, they can do that and I'll deal with it too. I'm trying to set an example of how legislators should behave. Don't run from any issue. And if Senator Foley wants to keep us here all afternoon, I will be here. I don't eat lunch. I don't have appointments. I'll wear everybody out.
