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that what we do must be right that even he worked on legislation that was technically, legally right. As far as I'm concerned, we should be advancing this bill. I understand some of the issues that are being raised. They are the issues, as has been stated on the floor, that were raised in 1997 when we passed the bill in the first place. But I think that those issues need to be raised in the form of legislation that abolishes the underlying bill and not in terms of the procedural kinds of things that we're dealing with here. In the same way that we improved, if that word...that is probably not the right word, made technically correct our death penalty statutes because those were existing statutes that had been put in place by a Legislature, we are doing the same thing here. And I think it reflects well on us as a body, whatever our belief about the merits of previous legislation, that we have legislation that is correct. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Brown. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, Senator Foley doesn't want to answer a question, so I'm going to tell you all some things. In the Judiciary Committee, we amend bills with material that was not a part of a hearing. Senator Foley knows that, if he's paid attention. He jumped on sexual orientation, and everybody knows that's his problem, and for him to pretend that it's not shows he is disingenuous, which is to use a nice word. Senator Foley had a fetus protection bill earlier in the session. I told him I was not going to fight it, and I didn't ask him for anything in return, and he knows that. But if he wants to set a line, I'm willing to draw that line and he will lose before I will. Because you all will bring him in line and you can't bring me in line. He won't bring the session to a halt, because he can't. He doesn't know how. He could not talk eight hours on the floor by himself on one issue. He could not create enough opportunities to do it. Nobody on this floor can. So when they talk about how easy it is, they don't do it because they can't do it. He can't do it. On what we're talking about here, it was sexual orientation that got Senator Foley to talking to the other senators on the committee who went with him. He hasn't stood on the floor and denied that, because they know. If nobody knew, then he probably would deny it. And
