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Medicaid. So it would not be surprising to come back in January and have to appropriate much of this new money, so-called money coming in, to pay our Medicaid deficits. We know long-term nursing home care is one of our highest, fastest rising areas, and we know also that with the economy like it is and the low return on CDs and all those things that that area is probably increasing rather rapidly. That's something that's hard to document, but it probably is. So I think that we should not be eyeing this money as a windfall in any way, shape or form. We should let it go to the Cash Reserve as it's determined at this point, let it go into the Medicaid area where it's determined, as it will, and we can come back next year through the deficit process or whatever the process we have and allocate it there properly as we determined at that time, and in the meantime it will very usefully serve its purposes for backup into cash flow, covering over the deficits and being used as we have proposed up until now without getting into this whole can of worms, as you will,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...of where this money should go. Because, I mean, we all want to go more for higher education. We all want to go for K-12. We all want to do the income tax. All those kinds of things obviously have their proponents. But if you want to go into that fight, I think it's the enormous area of where should we go. We had this morning on smoking cessation. So I think we need to think very carefully about upsetting the balance that we have arrived to at this point and when we have a pretty good proposal in place for the way this money should be handled if and when it comes, and it looks like it will come, but it's still uncertain as to the timing. But I think at a minimum it's going to be three months and probably a little longer before it even comes. That puts us halfway to the next session.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Thank you.
