SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Jones. Senator Redfield, followed by Senator Landis.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the body. When we adjourn sine die, the hard work will not stop. The hard work will just shift, because in fact the citizens of Nebraska face hard choices day after day. They are faced with the same cost increases that we have looked at here during our session. When they look at the costs that our agencies face in personnel, in health care, in utilities, supplies, they struggle with those every single day. They've seen their heating bills go up. They've seen their gasoline go up. They have seen their health care insurance premiums go up. They've seen their prescription drug costs go up. They have seen the fees go up for every state agency that they cash fund. What they haven't seen go up is their paychecks. In fact, sometimes they've seen them go down, with layoffs, with cuts, just to maintain a job, and with reduced hours. Because if you look at the monthly reports, as I do, from our Department of Labor, you will notice that while we used to lead the nation in the number of hours worked per week, the number of hours have decreased, because our businesses and our factories don't have overtime to give to their workers. They're lucky to find enough to do with the orders that they put out. And so somehow or other, our citizens will have to find a way to make those hard choices. What will it be? What will it be that they cannot purchase? If I could get the picture out of my mind of people struggling between choices of basic necessities, it would be easy for me to vote for this budget. It's the first time I have not voted for a budget since I've been here. But I can't get that picture out of my mind. If I thought that people just had mad money stuffed under their mattresses that they didn't need, it would be easy
