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the implication in the newscast was that I was happy about the budget and, by implication I suppose, happy about the tax bill and the tax increases, and I would like to say for the record emphatically that I am not happy. I'm satisfied, perhaps; satisfied with the Appropriations Committee work, satisfied with the quality of debate, and satisfied overall, overall, with the budget, and satisfied with the Revenue Committee's work and, yes, Senator Raikes, even with the Education Committee's work. But that doesn't mean I'm happy. I would rather not have amended the budget with the proposal to close the Lincoln Correctional Center. I would rather not have had the taxes on construction, Senator Synowiecki. But I would have rather had, say, an income tax than all the little fees and kinds of things that were imposed this year. I would rather have it based on the ability of people to pay. But I'm also long-serving enough, I guess, to know that sometimes you can't have it all and, as you all know, there has to be a lot of give and take in here. But Senator Mines' comments reminded me, especially his comments about campaign promises, reminded me of a story that I heard recently that Governor Huckabee of Arkansas told, and I'd kind of like to relay it to you. He was telling about a politician who died and he had gone to the Pearly Gates and Saint Peter had been there to meet him and welcomed him and said, you know, and now I'd like to take you on a little tour, and he said I would like to take you down to hell and then back up to heaven and have you decide which place you'd like to go. And the politician said fine. And so they got in the elevator and went down to hell and they looked around and the politician was absolutely astounded. It was green, it was beautiful, there were golf courses, everybody was happy, and he just couldn't believe it. He thought, well, if this is what hell is like, what is heaven going to be like? Well, they went upstairs and they went...they went all around heaven and they found that it was beautiful and that it was very calming and that there was a lot of music and it was a very wonderful place. And the politician...or Saint Peter said to the politician, now where would you like to spend the rest of your time? And the politician thought and he said, well, I said...I never thought I would say this, but I think I would like to go to hell. And Saint Peter said to him, fine, and it was done, and he went back down the elevator and knocked on the door and it was opened and
