the sky was the limit. Programs were started. We had things from the federal government that were imposed on us that we had to do. But if we come back and not...if we don't do some of the things we're intending on doing here we're going to put higher education at a threshold that it was 100 years ago, 200 years ago where only the people with a few bucks were able to educate their children, and I don't want to get in that position again. I believe that every child in this state should have the opportunity to go to a state college or a university at a reasonable cost, and I also believe that everyone's grandmother or parent has the right to a decent life when they can no longer take care of themselves. I think we've all been in that situation at one time or another and seen loved ones have to be taken care of by someone other than themselves or their family. That's the situation we've got ourselves into. And also with the corrections, what we did five, six years ago when we said let's lock every one of those criminals up, throw the key away, we'll show them, but what happened was we got a little carried away. Now we're coming back to address those issues again, in reverse order. None of us will be here in a few years, but I know what's going to happen. They'll do the same darn thing we did over the last five or six years. And they'll be...hopefully, they will be here, our...the people who are going to be taking our places will be here when it turns around again. These things go in cycles, folks. They always do. No, I don't like to pay taxes, but if I make a few bucks I don't mind paying taxes. I think that is a privilege that we have for living in a country and a state that we live in. Taxes are something that we help other people with, and we help ourselves also. So I'm going to be supporting...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...the overrides, as I did on the last one, this one and the next one. You're going to go home and you're going to be chastised for doing what you did, but every day each one of us is questions on it...are questioned on decisions that we make. These are the big ones. Every bill that you run there is opposition to it somewhere along the way. That's why you're here, is to make those choices.
