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thing to do for the people of Nebraska. As we have discussed, we have other revenue forecasts coming down the pike. We are hoping that the economy will continue on an upswing, that we've troughed out, and that we're going to come back up. However, we've depleted our funds very low, and we need this money to remain in abeyance, particularly if we have the low-level waste money that may...we may need to come up right away with too. So there are some other places where this money might be needed, unforeseen to us right now, that are possibilities that could happen. I would recommend we do the fiscally responsible thing for today, which would seem to be to hold the money in a reserve at this time. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Combs. Senator Synowiecki.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Senator Beutler, if you would yield. Just make sure I'm...AM2086, your first amendment, would refund education at its previous set allocation, and AM2099 offsets the income tax increases in the revenue bill. Is that correct, Senator?

SENATOR BEUTLER: That's mostly...

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...correct, Senator. The first one is just not the university. It's K-12 and it's the state colleges and it's the community colleges.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Now, as you mentioned many times, this is part of a federal economic stimulus package that it comes to our state. My amendment, which is upcoming as well, offsets the tax on reconstruction. As far as economy, the stimulation of the economy, which of the three do you think would be most effective in that area? I suspect that this tax on reconstruction may provide a disincentive for a lot of capital improvements and rehabilitations of homes and small businesses and so forth. I believe it applies to small businesses as well. Out of them three choices, which do you think that would provide the most stimulus?
