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program is designed, as indicated, not to have any General Fund expense. One can argue about the...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...reallocation of resources and the wisdom of that. The only expense that I see in the mix of that argument is the \$60,000 for the new administrator's expense. That's the way I see it, anyway.

SPEAKER BROMM: I think I'm about out of time, but I do appreciate that answer. But I would like to explore a little bit more how we feel the \$60,000 position can be funded. What...someone will have to make a decision on what's going to be cut in order to fund that. And so I'm interested in finding out who will make that kind of decision, and what might be cut in order to fund that position. Because, I mean, I don't want the tour guides not giving tours here. They do a wonderful job, and I think it's a great thing we need for the public to have. And so I don't want somebody doing something like that, if you understand what I mean.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Um-hum.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SPEAKER BROMM: So I...I'll explore it a little bit more. I put my light on again. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Bromm. Those senators wishing to speak to the Wehrbein amendment, Senators Engel, Beutler, Bromm, Wehrbein, Vrtiska. Senator Engel.
