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very well, and these are long term benefits. It may be a LB 775 company open to some criticism out there, but if you take the estimates that it will raise the price of corn 10 cents a bushel within a 70-mile radius of the plant, that affects 112 million bushels of corn on an annual production basis. That's 11-plus million dollars per year on an annual basis put back into the economy that wasn't there before. And I just...I hate to see us try and dilute ourselves in our efforts, what we're doing, what we did. And it shows results. They are out there today. It worked. And I'm having a hard time getting information from the Rural Development Commission. There are some people here saying, yes, they want to do this. Some saying I don't know. There is no one out in the Rotunda representing the Rural Development Commission. I think that says volumes about what they think. There is no one out there that cares enough to be out in the Rotunda. They're kind of staying away apparently. So I question, a few months ago we took them out of the state's statutes, and they were supportive of that, had no problems with it. We supported that. I voted for that, as I recall, to get them out of state statutes. And here we are back being led by basically a group of urban senators saying this is what rural Nebraska needs. And it's like me proposing a Lincoln economic development corporation for Senator Schimek's district, or a north Omaha economic development corporation for Senator Chambers. He's...they're trying to tell us what we need in rural Nebraska. I'm out there. I represent them. I've been through this process. What we did worked great, and to come back with a proposal to put them back in the statutes, when they are not out in the Rotunda saying, yes, we want to do this, questions whether this isn't just strictly political, trying to make a statement. Maybe the meeting that they had with those senators, and I did not attend, was not handled correctly. I don't know. I wasn't there. But I can't, for the life of me, find anybody in rural Nebraska that says, by golly, we need to do this. We've got to have that Rural Development Commission put back in state statutes or we're just going to fall apart out there. I think it's false hope. I think it's disingenuous. I think it's misleading. They aren't out there saying we need to do it in the Rotunda.
