SENATOR BAKER: One minute.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Okay. And then I had another question concerning on page 4, lines 17 to 22. I don't think I understand what those say. Could you explain those to me, please? I'll read it: "To the extent that the authorization of casino gambling pursuant to this subsection results in the creation of additional rights for federally recognized Indian tribes in Nebraska in accordance with federal law, the Governor and the Legislature shall recognize such rights and act in accordance therewith." What are we saying?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: That is a recognition of the fact that by having casino gambling we would trigger rights, the rights of our Native American citizens under federal law, to begin the process of negotiation for casinos on their lands.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: That would be true whether it was in this particular amendment or not, wouldn't it?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Yes, I think that's true.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Okay. Thank you.

SENATOR BAKER: Time. Thank you, Senator Pederson. Senator Schrock.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I commend Senator Brashear for bringing this issue to us and making us aware of what is going on in the state of Iowa. First of all, let me say I thought this issue was dead until next year, and I'm a little surprised, but that's okay. I don't quite understand how Atokad and Horsemen's Park are left out of the mix. Horsemen's Park does allow, I think, at least one day of live racing. But that matters very little to me in the scheme of things. I don't believe I like the idea of a futures trust. I think the citizens of the state of Nebraska would like to see what revenue would be generated from this for some tax relief, in whatever form or another. I kind of liken it to earmarking tobacco tax money, earmarking alcohol tax money.
