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others. Senator Schimek, you're recognized.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, thank you, Mr. Speaker and members, Mr. President and members. I rise in support of the motion to return to Select, and I thank Senator Brashear for his research and for the work he's done on this. His amendment actually does meet some of my criteria and all along I felt that we needed to have a limited number of casinos and it needed to be regulated by the state. His amendment does that. I felt all along that we should have some kind of a trust fund that would be...that could be used for community improvement purposes, and I believe the language in here may have been at my suggestion that we not use the term "community betterment," because that is confusing with language that is already in the constitution, and that "community improvement" really means that a community could apply for grants to really use this in any way that would improve their communities, primarily infrastructure, but there might be other...other means or other uses for which the money could be used. And then including the economic development component has always been in the back of my mind. My only hesitation in putting it in the constitution was that we were always trying to keep the constitutional amendment as simple as possible. I think Senator Smith has raised an excellent point and I personally would like to see some amendatory language, the more I think about it, if it is going to be a trust fund, that we have some direct legislative regulation over that trust fund. If we do instead, as Senator Chambers suggests, just take it out of the constitution entirely, we could always come back, as I think we've always intended to do next year, with the enabling legislation that sets out exactly how this money would be disbursed and how it would be disbursed. We've, some of us who worked on this issue for a long time, have always felt that we ought not to dump this money into our General Funds; that this ought not to be something that you come to depend on. Rather, it should be used for specific one-time projects that could help provide some relief to your General Fund budget but yet, at the same time, would be a one-time expenditure; would not be ongoing. Senator Chambers, I did have my staff look in the constitution, do a word search. The only other trust fund that we can find in the constitution is the Educational Lands and Funds Trust Fund, so there is precedent for doing this, but
