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expanded a bit to include perhaps the existing racetrack that is there in Omaha. However, if this is our only choice, and I'm not sure that it is, I will again support this. If you consider everything that we've done this year, we've said no to casinos, so far. Senator Tyson would have you believe that people are clamoring for concealed carry. We've rejected that. We've raised taxes. We passed or advanced a repeal of the term limits. We've done a lot of things that nobody in here wanted to do, and yet we have a proposal in front of us that I feel the majority of Nebraskans want and I think that it's time that we move it forward in whatever form. Again, I will support Senator Brashear's motion to return and his adoption, however, if someone had an amendment to reduce the number of casinos in the underlying bill, I'd support that as well. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Bourne. Senator Cudaback.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Mr. Speaker, members, I apologize for talking twice on this issue, but sometimes we think what we have to say is the most important thing going. I forgot to say that a number, I hate to put a number in the constitution. It's probably the wrong thing to do. Sometimes numbers become the so-called goal, and there could be more casinos put in than perhaps the body wants. What's wrong with letting the body decide, the Legislature, us? I'll be gone probably, but let the body decide. If we're going to do this, let the body decide. Maybe it's one. Maybe it's two. Like Senator Johnson said, maybe it would just be one on the east side of town or whatever. But you put a number in the constitution, this group of people here, we're all going to be gone. They're going to say, hey, we can have six. They're going to shoot for six. I think that's bad. What...just have no number, what's wrong with that? Let the body. Think of yourself. Would you, you know, do the right thing? Sure, you would. The number is probably the wrong thing, but if Senator Brashear...maybe he's weighed his options here and...but I...he is reducing it at least from eight down to six, and I'd like to see it even go lower if it has to be a number. But why...what's arbitrary? I mean I guess I don't see it. And with that, I guess...I guess that's it, Mr. Speaker. Thank you.
