SENATOR ERDMAN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature. I'm going to rise...surprisingly, I know...in opposition to AM2102. And I think that there's been some interesting points brought up. And one of the driving factors that I seem to hear from at least Senator Brashear is, is that, well, we need to do this because of Carter Lake. They're going to do whatever they're going to do, from the Iowa perspective, regardless of what we do. And I think Senator Smith probably had it right. If we allow it, they're more likely to put one there, because it won't be a flagrant kind of a thumb our nose at you idea. I also have concerns that we're going to put this money in another trust fund. Who knows? Maybe by the time I'm out of here we'll raid that as well. But I'm going to rise in opposition to AM2102. And I don't...I read the votes, 25 to return it, and a couple people were second-guessing that idea. So it will be interesting to see what the votes are on this idea and this amendment.
