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the next session.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Thank you. I'll return the rest of my time back to the Chair.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Vrtiska. Senator Kruse.

SENATOR KRUSE: Thank you, Mr. President and members. I'll be very brief because much has been said, but what has not been said is our obligation. This is tobacco settlement money and I still see it as tobacco settlement money. We have been shuffling the money under the peas but that's where it started. That's what was proposed. The Governor has supported it. Appropriations supported it. Because we were pushing funds around out here, it was stranded. It is an excellent program and, Senator Bourne, it doesn't have any relation to Utah, and we are not talking about kids that are likely to get onto the net. We are talking about face-to-face contacts by a network that is established in our schools that needs an administrative structure to keep that going. It doesn't take a lot of money, but it does take that structure to keep that thing going. We've got the system set up there in our schools and we really need to keep it going. But it is, to my mind, tobacco settlement money that we've shifted around and I'm welcome this, that we can go back to it.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Kruse. Senator Erdman. He waives his opportunity to speak. Senator Bourne.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Mr. President. I'd yield my time to Senator Baker.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Baker.

SENATOR BAKER: Thank you, Senator Bourne. I may be next in lights. I lost track there. I just can't believe what we're doing here. We have been lectured all session long. Here we are two days from adjournment, and we were lectured all session long by our Appropriations Committee, General Fund money, we can't touch it. We need \$20,000 here. It adds up, pretty soon, and what are we doing? We're taking \$405,000 of found money, or
